Spelling can be terrifying

Some words you just have to learn letter by letter - and that's hard going. But if you know the rules in this booklet then huge amounts of words become easy.

#### <u>Learn Your Spellings</u>

- 1. When you're learning to spell a word for the first time, look at it written down, and <u>say it again and again.</u>
- 2. <u>Copy it out</u> over and over again.
- 3. Say the word <u>one syllable at a time (over and over again</u>). e.g. **ex-tra**ord-in-ar-y.
- 4. <u>Write a sentence</u> to help you remember. e.g. **might M**oths In Gardens Hug Trees.

#### If You Forget How To Spell A Word

- 1. Think about the <u>rules in this booklet</u>
- 2. Think about words that <u>sound</u> familiar. Maybe your tricky word is <u>spelt</u> in a similar way. e.g. **sign**, de**sign**.
- Try <u>writing the word down</u> a few different ways sometimes one way will just look right.
- 4. If you're not doing a test you can look it up in a dictionary.




#### Making words ending in $\underline{o}$ or $\underline{a}$ plural

To make most words ending in <u>o</u> and <u>a</u> plural, just add <u>s</u>.






When you add <u>ing</u>, <u>double</u> the <u>last letter</u> of a word if it comes straight after a short vowel.

A short vowel is the <u>a</u> as in <u>plan</u>, a long vowel sound is the <u>a</u> in <u>plane</u>.




